Even when she was fighting for her life in the ICU, although she was not able to talk, she gave me a final thumbs up to signal that she will be fine. Now she is watching over me, my every move and I have to be in my best behavior, or else.....she will make sure that I do things right. I am the person today, because of her. She was my guiding light. She is my beating heart. She will always be. We have countless memories and I'll cherish them every day for the rest of my life.
